The Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) can provide technical assistance to landowners interested in addressing resource concerns associated with agricultural production, such as maintaining or improving soil or water quality, protecting wildlife habitat, developing pollinator habitat, and managing forest lands.



the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) to assist agricultural landowners in implementing practices that help conserve natural resources. Both the land and the applicant(s) must meet certain eligibility requirements and establish farm records with the Farm Services Agency. Funding provided through this program is taxable.



High tunnels (seasonal cover structures used to grow crops in the ground) are part of this program, and can assist landowners in producing local food by extending the growing season, controlling water application or irrigation, and facilitating nutrient and pest management.

Other projects include fish habitat improvement, technical assistance on composting, invasive weed control or eradication, irrigation systems, grazing management, and organizational support and development of community watershed councils.
